Partnering With Emory For Local Peace Initiatives

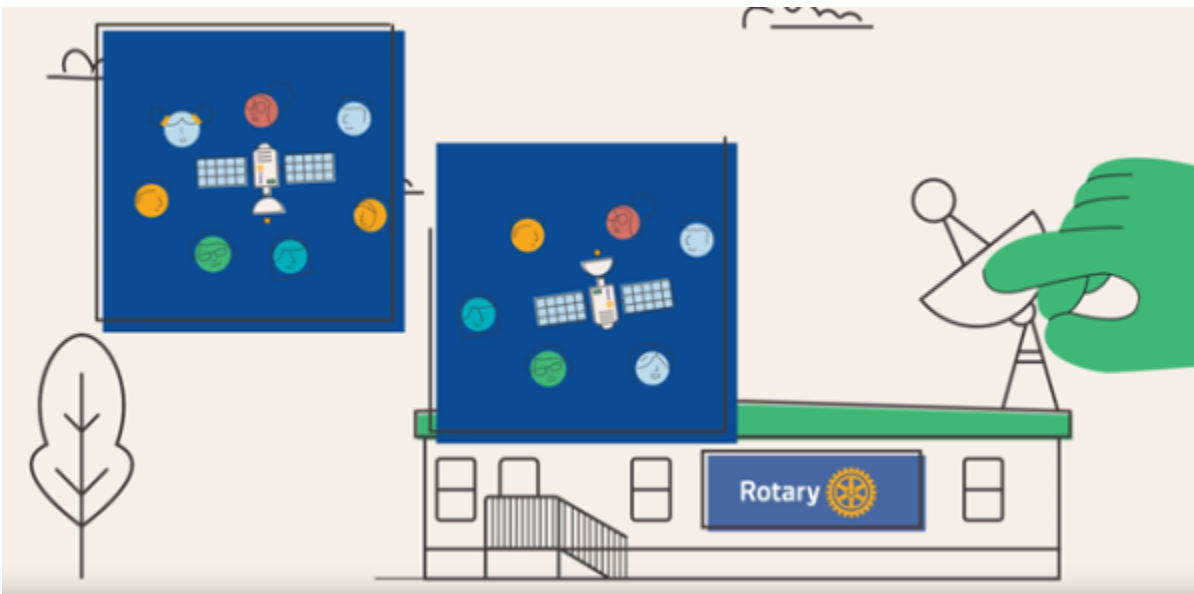

End Polio Now

Remember: #1 Issue is Eradicating Polio

The number one initiative of Rotary International is to eradicate Polio.

The picture to the left provides the three main elements of information every Rotarian should know about Polio if ever asked by anyone outside of Rotary. It covers who it mainly affects, what can be done about it and where we are today in the fight against Polio. That might be enough for most people, but as Rotarians, knowing a bit more is never a bad thing, so let's cover a few extra points that may be considered, "nice to have", but they sure are important.

Are you aware that Rotarians have donated billions of dollars in the global effort to rid the world of Polio? Additionally, we have donated countless hours dedicated to the fight against the disease, so numerous, it's hard to keep an accurate count.

Rotary International as well as individual clubs worldwide have been the main advocates to governments to increase their contributions to the fight against Polio. Via the Rotary vaccination program millions of children have been helped against this disease in countries around the world.

Through Polio Plus many additional benefits have been seen beyond polio eradication such as increased medical treatment, access to clean water and even soap disbursement. With notable partnerships including the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the World Health Organization, and governments around the world, the eradication of polio worldwide is truly in sight. There has been a 99.9% reduction in polio cases since 1979. Polio is only endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan now and even they are now in our

sights.

Understanding the impact cannot be fully understood unless one has this one final fact. If our eradication efforts were to cease today, as many as 200,000 children could be paralyzed each year. If that isn't enough to know we must continue to push on, I don't know what is. Together we can end polio forever.

Honoring the Start of It All

February came and went this year with, in many ways, very little fanfare. It really shouldn't have. A date that most likely slipped past most of us, even those of us who consider ourselves very good Rotarians and done so with very good and viable reason, may well have missed February 23rd this year. It marked the 120th anniversary of Chicago attorney Paul Harris forming the Rotary Club of Chicago in 1905.

The quote above is one most Rotarians are familiar with, uttered by Paul Harris in 1914. It sums up so well what we as Rotarians strive to achieve...Results! Recently Trustee Chair-Elect Holger Knaack spoke to the International Assembly in Orlando, Florida. The crux of his message aimed at the gathering of District Governor-Elects was to remind them that they are leaders not only as the head of their respective districts, but also as the leader by example. He encouraged them to make their own donation to the Rotary Foundation not because they should do it, but rather because it is the right thing to do and then to be encouraging to all, we of the rank-and-file Rotarians, to follow suit and do the same, for the same reason.

Chairman-Elect Knaak continued by putting forth what he termed, "some simple points" of suggestion. He stated, "Our Foundation is unique because most of the decisions about how money is used are made by you.." referring to the districts, clubs and donors via the district and global grants. As your District Foundation Chair this year, I can certainly attest that fact. I am honored to be a part of the process of both levels of grants. The grants I have personally been able to help move through the system are nothing short of miraculous. Chairman Knaak's words are certainly exemplified here in District 6900. I have the honor of working with and serving with District Governor Owen moving these grants forward.

Chairman-Elect Knaak also spoke passionately about the role of Rotary Peace Centers and the training of professionals in conflict resolution around the globe, as yet another example of the influence of the Rotary Foundation. He also spoke about the near eradication of polio as you have already seen in my polio article and the worldwide partnerships forged over time because of our success achieving...Results!! Should we be surprised by this? Of course not, because that's what we as Rotarians do.

In April of 2024, Rotarians Synthia Padala, PAG Dr. Paddy Sharma, and DGND Cynthia Dorsey Edwards, initiated an event, with the support of then DG Andre' Marria, in which 33 women were recognized as Women of Impact for their achievements in a wide variety of fields.

Since then, a committee formed from this group of Rotarians and other leaders has been meeting to further goals of addressing key issues affecting women and girls. (Core group members are listed on the attached flyer.) This group has established the first USA chapter of the Rotary Fellowship for Empowering Women (RFEW). Its parent organization was created in 2021 by Rotarian women in Rotary District 9211, comprised of Uganda and Tanzania in the Eastern region of Africa. Here in the USA, chapter members have decided to focus their work in six main areas for 2025-2026: 1.) Mental Health Concerns and Resources, 2.) Workforce Development/STEAM Initiatives, 3.) Menopause - Understanding, Resources, and Advocacy, 4.) A Bi-annual Awards and Recognition Program [for 2026], 5.) Global Connections, and 6.) Sponsorships. The group appreciates the on-going support of PDG Andre' Marria, DG Gordon Owens, and the entire DG-team.

The first public activity of the USA chapter is to host a free webinar on Menopause which is open to Rotarians as well as non-Rotarians. The audience is not limited to women only. All attendees may learn and benefit from information on this critical, life-altering subject.

Rotary Club of Alpharetta Raises \$280,000 for Non-profits



February 1st started chilly for the Seventh Annual Polar Bear Plunge, with the water languishing in the low 30s. But by 10:00 AM, over 200 jumpers had gathered, costumed as everything from macaroni & cheese to superheroes, and were ready for feats of aerial acrobatics into the pool. The teams, comprised of volunteers of all ages, attacked their jump tasks with the enthusiasm of polar bears on the prowl. High-flying flips, belly flops, and organized, sequential diving delighted the crowd gathered around fire pits.

The first Polar Bear Plunge generated \$32,000 for non-profit organizations. This year, we collected a steaming \$280,000 for our Jump Teams. The formula is simple. Non-profits (including other Rotary Clubs) form teams and raise money for their cause. **Rotary Club of Alpharetta** manages and markets the event, keeping 10% of all proceeds. The Club sees no end in sight for growth.

GRSP Update

Two Students Honored with Barbara M and Donald L Thomas Peace Awards

The Georgia Rotary Student Program celebrates two scholars who promote peace and understanding among their peers and nations. Rotary International marks February 23 to celebrate its 120th anniversary and World Understanding and Peace Day as it is also the anniversary of the first Rotary meeting in 1905.

Two GRSP scholars were honored in their respective host Rotary Club meetings recently by Committee Chair John Carruth representing the **Roswell Rotary Club** and presenting the Barbara M. and Donald L. Thomas Peace Award to Shifa Maherali Jiwani of India and Jordan Laurent Noueku of Cameroon. The pair will also be recognized at the Georgia United District Conference in April.

Jiwani attends Kennesaw State University and is sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of East Cobb and Paulding County. Immediately volunteering in the US healthcare system followed by her research journey that she started as a freshman at Kennesaw into antimicrobial resistance, which may result in saving millions of lives around the world, helped her standout.

“We were very impressed with her desire to become a healthcare professional to help overcome the healthcare inequities in impoverished areas of the world, having witnessed in her native country of India,”

Carruth said.

Noueku attends Morehouse College and is sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Midtown Atlanta, Atlanta West End and Fayetteville. His letter introduced himself as a young man willing to give back with his time and talents, and also one for whom the monetary award would be a great help as he seeks medical education so he may help others.

“Jordan’s journey has not been easy in pursuit of this goal, with many setbacks and financial struggles along the way, first with even being able to come to America, then with high school in San Francisco, and now in college at Morehouse,” Carruth said. “We hope that this award, in some small way, will help you on your path toward becoming a medical technician and being able to give back to those who have helped you get this far.”

Roswell Rotarian PDG Bob Hagan stated that Donald, chairman of Anchor Savings Bank, and Barbara, who did not work for the bank but was featured in promotions, were known throughout Georgia for their 1980s rhyming radio and television advertising, “Your Anchor Banker, he understands. Yes, your Anchor Banker, she understands.” Donald died in 2006 and Barbara in 2013.

As Roswell Rotarians the Thomases were strong supporters of GRSP. Both were recognized as Kendall-Weisiger Fellows, distinction awarded by the GRSP Foundation for contributions of \$5,000 or more. In June 1992, they created a substantial Charitable Remainder Trust to be given to GRSP. In June 2001, they established the Barbara M. and Donald L. Thomas Peace Award to a recipient who exhibits the spirit of the program, exemplifies Service-Above-Self and expresses evidence of additional financial assistance to meet the needs associated with their education or career goals. Thanks to their generosity, this year an award of \$2,500 was presented to each recipient.

Students arrived on Valentine's Day for a pizza party and game night. On Saturday morning, they packed 10,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger, and the Rotary Club of Dunwoody was recognized for reaching a 100,000-meal milestone with Rise Against Hunger ... most of those meals packed over the last 10 years by GRSP students. Students learned that this year's meals were going to Honduras as part of a food/education program for elementary students.

Dunwoody Rotarian Peter Sherman led Saturday afternoon's leadership "boot camp" - focused on servant leadership, teamwork, and project planning. These skills were put to work in Sunday morning's "Shark Tank" - facilitated by the Rotaract Club of Atlanta. Student teams developed projects aligned with Rotary's seven areas of focus, in hopes of winning \$1,000 funding for their project. This year, five of the projects focused on Georgia, and two on international projects. The "Disease Prevention & Treatment" team came in first with their elementary school fitness program targeting a SW Atlanta school. All the ideas were awesome and students were encouraged to take their projects back to their sponsoring countries here and in their home countries.

Blakely Continues to Honor County's Top Students

Early County High School senior Banks Bell and Southwest Georgia Academy senior Grant Fletcher were announced as the county's STAR STUDENT award winners at a **Blakely Rotary Club** meeting in December. The STAR STUDENT and STAR TEACHER project is sponsored by the Blakely-Early County Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Rotary Club. Chamber Chairwoman-elect DeWana Fields presented the checks to the winners.

As the systemwide county winner, Bell will compete further in statewide competition. He named Early County High School teacher Chris Peace as his STAR TEACHER. Fletcher named SGA teacher and head

football coach Kerry Morris as his STAR TEACHER honoree. The Rotary Club awarded the student winners \$500 each and Bell received a bonus of \$250 for being systemwide winner. Each STAR TEACHER took home a \$100 gift certificate to be used in local businesses.

Bell, a four-year letterman on the ECHS tennis team (coached by his mother Angela Bell), will attend Georgia Technological Institute in the fall. He is particularly gifted in computer science and was a key cog in the school's development of such a program. Banks is a dually-enrolled student. By graduation, he will have earned enough credits from ABAC to almost be classified as a sophomore at Tech.

In thanking Bell for the honor of being his STAR TEACHER, Peace said, "In my mind, there is not a more rewarding moment than having a student say that you made a difference in their life as an educator." He also said Bell exemplifies his belief that "a great student is not just someone who earns high grades but someone who demonstrates a strong commitment to learning, personal growth and discipline."

He added other virtues of top students: "They are naturally curious and eager to explore new ideas; they ask insightful questions; they manage their time effectively; they stay focused; they see failures not as obstacles but more as opportunities to learn; they think outside the box. Ultimately a great student is dedicated, curious and willing to put in the effort to learn and grow..." He went on to say, "Banks Bell personifies these qualities... he brings great questions to class. I cannot think of anything that he would be able to accomplish...as long as he sets his mind on the task and pursues it with the same tenacity and vigor that he has demonstrated during his high school years,"

SGA Administrator Matt Dalrymple said that in addition to Grant Fletcher's scholastic and athletic abilities, "he always has a smile on his face." A four-year member of the Warrior football team and All-Region selection three times, Grant has attended SGA for 14 years. He's been a Beta Club and Student Council member for four years and in FFA for one year. He has won myriad academic subject awards. Grant also received the UGA Certificate of Merit and was Junior Marshal at SGA graduation last year.

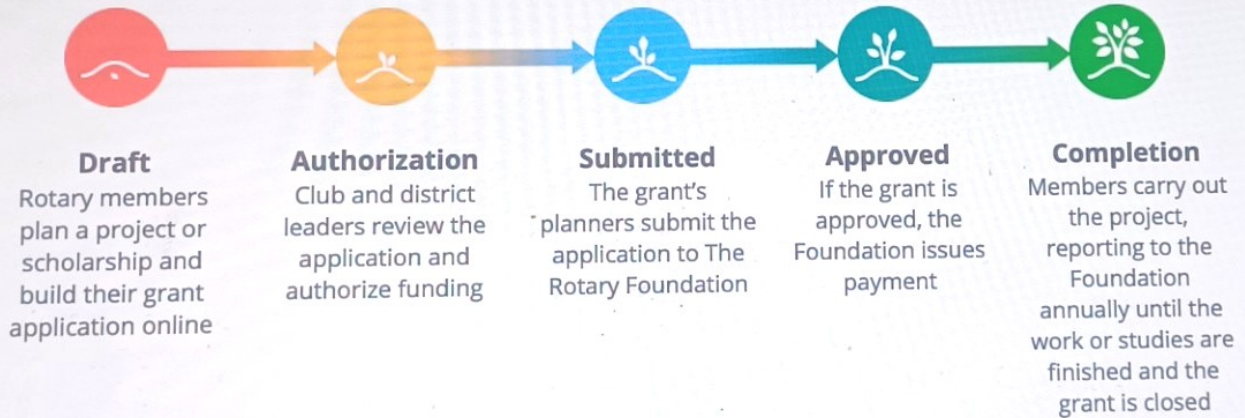

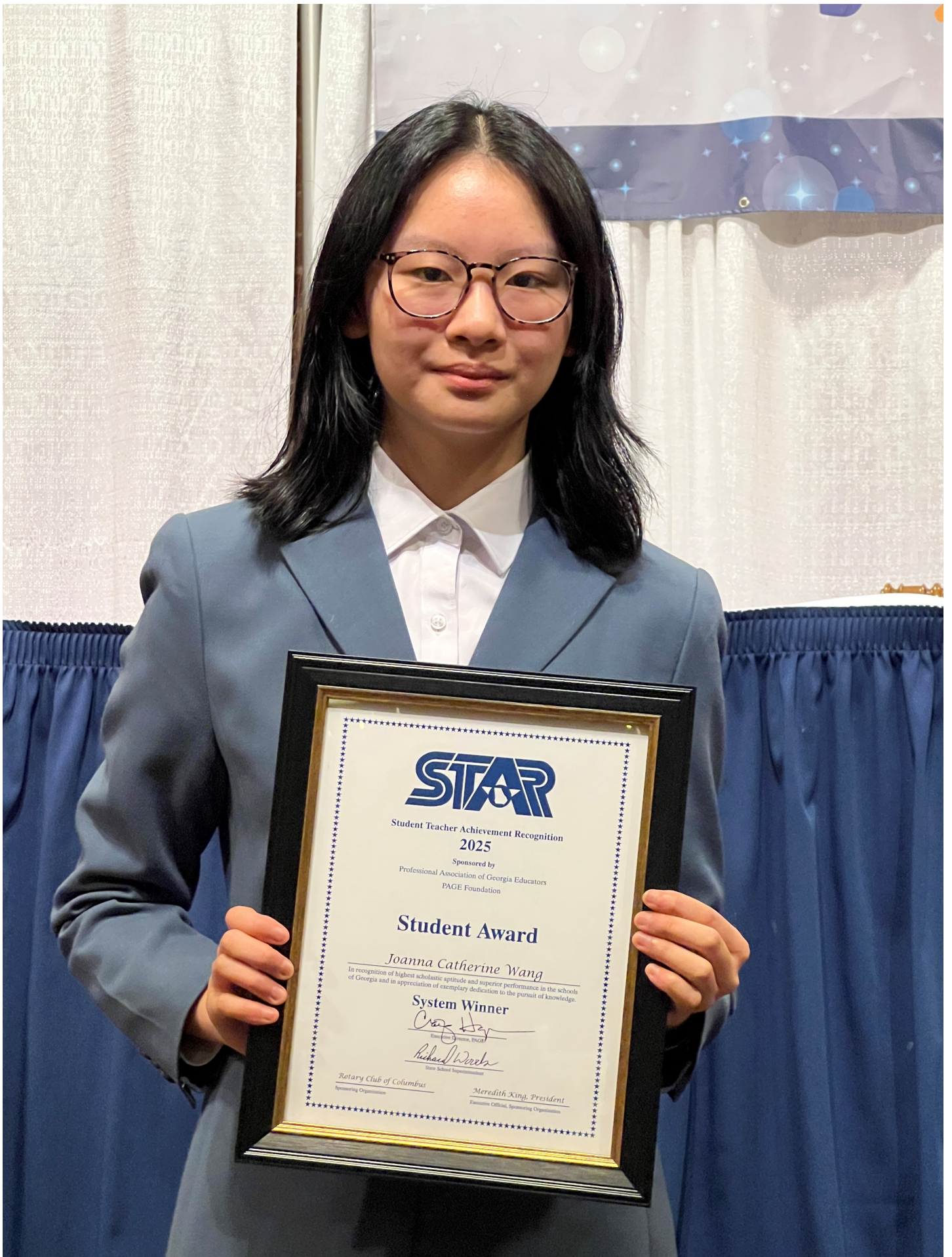
